LINCOLN COUNTY BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS MEETING MINUTES

December 20, 2022 Courthouse Commissioner Room Ivanhoe, MN 56142

The meeting was called to order at 9:00 a.m. by Board Chair Corey Sik, followed by the Pledge of Allegiance. Commissioners present were Joe Drietz, Steve Hauswedell, Dean Nielsen, Corey Sik, and Mic VanDeVere. Also present was Lincoln County Auditor-Treasurer, Deb Vierhuf and Lincoln County Attorney, Glen Petersen. No conflicts of interest were noted.

Motion by Drietz, seconded by Nielsen to approve the consent agenda which included approval of the minutes from December 6, 2022, and the agenda for December 20, 2022. All voted in favor.

Lisa Graphenteen, Director of Housing and Economic Development, informed the Board that in the initial findings of the environmental review for the Hole in the Mountain project, it was determined that we would need to have an archeological study. Graphenteen had sent out requests for proposals to three different firms for the Archeological Study. We received one proposal. The proposal received was from 106 Group. Since the exact location of some of the improvements have not been identified, the quote was structured into two parts. The first part is research and office work and the second part is field work. There is a wide range of cost for the field work because the exact scope of the project has not been identified. There are a couple options for the Board to consider. Option one would be to move ahead with the research and office work and when it comes time to do the field work, have them hold off until the engineer has done some of his design work and we have the locations identified. Option two would be to reject this proposal and get proposals after the engineer has done the design work. After discussion, the Board was in consensus with waiting and going out for proposals at a later date. Once WSB determines the location of the project, Graphenteen will go out for proposals again and then bring the proposals back to the Board. Information only.

Amber Scholten informed the Board that Lincoln County has been declared a disaster due to the December 13th winter storm and requested approval of Resolution No. 38-2022 Declaring a State of Emergency. Motion by Hauswedell, seconded by VanDeVere to approve Resolution No. 38-2022 Declaring a State of Emergency for the December 13, 2022 Winter Storm. All voted in favor.

Resolution No. 38-2022 Declaring a State of Emergency

WHEREAS the winter storm event caused by ice, snow and winds starting December 13th, 2022 impacted the population of Lincoln County and its cities: and

WHEREAS the winter storm event starting Dec 13th, 2022 has caused a significant amount of public property damage; and

WHEREAS the Lincoln County Department of Emergency Management requests the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners to declare Lincoln County in the STATE OF EMERGENCY for the December 13th, 2022;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners declares Lincoln County in a State of Emergency for conditions resulting from the winter storm event starting December 13th, 2022.

Adopted by the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners this 20th day of December, 2022.

Curt Madsen was present to give an update on the Lincoln County Fair. His update included the following:

- The fair went very well in 2022.
- The open class exhibits increased and the 4-H numbers stayed stable.
- There was a balance left after the fair was complete.
- The excess \$3,000 that the county contributes for the mower is kept in a separate account so it will not get spent on anything else.
- Grants were received for the entertainment and for improving the horse barns.
- A new caretaker is maintaining the grounds and is doing a good job.

Information only.

Mike Budd and Andy Stetter, US Fish and Wildlife Service, were present to introduce themselves. They are actively looking for property and feel it is nice to visit with the Board prior to bringing a purchase to the Board.

Commissioner VanDeVere commented that he does want the US Fish and Wildlife to look at land carefully so that productive land is not taken out of production. Budd agreed and stated that they are more interested in hay and pasture land that can continue to be grazed. Commissioner Hauswedell questioned why tree removal is done on some of the US Fish and Wildlife land. Budd said they manage the grasslands to restore them back to prairie land. Information only.

Karen Lichtsinn, Lincoln County Historical Society Board Member, inquired as to if Lincoln County plans to do anything for the 150-year anniversary of Lincoln County in 2023. Some of the things the Historical Society will be doing are as follows:

- They will enhance their float and have it in every Lincoln County parade this summer.
- They will be ordering commemorative medallions to be handed out at the parades.
- They will have a booth at the Lincoln County Fair.
- They will reach out to the newspapers to see if a historical section could be put in the paper with items and pictures from the last 50 years.

Lichtsinn also mentioned that it would be nice to get some funding to help pay for some of these items. Commissioner Sik mentioned that they should reach out to the Travel SW MN group or the SW Tourism group to see if something could be done through these organizations. Information only.

Glen Petersen, Lincoln County Attorney, presented an agreement between Linda and Steven Polkow, Joseph and Judy Weber and Weber Farms Inc. Currently Linda and Steven Polkow are land locked and they would like a recorded easement through the Weber property and the County property. A transfer of land to the Polkow's, in recognition of the historic line on the property, is also within the agreement. Petersen stated that there could be additional changes to the agreement, but wanted to have a consensus on if the Board was in favor of this. Commissioner VanDeVere wants to be sure that there are no issues going through the County Park. Commissioner Drietz does not feel any land owner should be land locked. Petersen could add language to limit the easement for farm use only. Commissioner Hauswedell feels there should be some kind of gate so the public does not think this easement is for ATV vehicles. Motion by VanDeVere, seconded by Drietz to approve Petersen moving forward and working with the landowners to have the easement agreement between Polkow's, Weber's and Lincoln County. All voted in favor.

Chad Meester, Lincoln County Sheriff, presented a quote for a new Sheriff's server. Lincoln County recently had a security audit and one of the items that needs to be addressed is having the Sheriff's office on their own server. Chris Cauwels attended via zoom and stated that this is a recommendation from the BCA to increase security. Two quotes were received and are as follows:

• The Computer Man Inc. \$15,793.00

• Morris Electronics \$23,196.67

Cauwels recommendation is to go with the quote from The Computer Man Inc. Meester stated that his 2022 budget has money available and if 911 funds are able to be accessed, he will use those funds as well. Motion by VanDeVere, seconded by Drietz to approve the Sheriff's server quote from The Computer Man Inc. in the amount of \$15,793.00. All voted in favor.

Meester wanted to thank the maintenance department for all of the snow removal and other items that they do for the County. Information only.

Dustin Hauschild, Lincoln County Environmental, informed the Board that Lincoln County was recommended for the funding from the MN West Lidar 3DEP. An agreement will be forth coming for the \$20,000.00 we obligated to the Lidar Project. Lincoln County Soil and Water obligated \$3,000.00. Information only.

Hauschild presented the 2023 AIS Prevention Plan for approval. Motion by Drietz, seconded by Nielsen, to approve the 2023 Aquatic Invasive Species Prevention Plan which allows us to receive our AIS funding in the estimated amount of \$63,611.00. All voted in favor.

Hauschild requested approval of the East River Easement that was presented for review at the last Meeting. Attorney Petersen stated that he reviewed the agreement and it is fine to approve. Motion by Nielsen, seconded by Hauswedell, to approve the East River Easement which will affect the Lincoln County Landfill property. All voted in favor.

Hauschild informed the Board that he would like to amend the motion from October 4th for the Ground Works quote to repair CD #37, which ended up higher due to additional 24" tile. Motion by Drietz, seconded by Nielsen to amend the motion from October 4th, as follows – to hire Ground Works to replace 1,970 feet of tile on BR 2 Fork 1 and 205' of tile on Br 2 of CD #37 with the cost not to exceed \$6,800.00 \$9,000.00. All voted in favor.

Hauschild informed the Board that the AMC Drainage Conference will be held February 8-9 at Arrowwood in Alexandria, MN. Hauschild plans to attend and any Commissioners that would like to attend are welcome. Information only.

Hauschild presented Resolution 37-2022 for approval. This resolution will loan money to the ditch account for CD #14's repair. Motion by Drietz, seconded by Hauswedell to approve Resolution 37-2022 Ditch System One Year Loan. All voted in favor.

RESOLUTION NO. 37-2022 RESOLUTION OF THE LINCOLN COUNTY DITCH SYSTEM FOR ONE-YEAR LOAN

BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Commissioners, acting Ditch Authority, County of Lincoln, State of Minnesota, that the following ditch transfers are herewith adopted; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Lincoln County General Fund loan to the following ditch system in the total sum of \$131,000.00 for the duration of one (1) year with interest at the rate of 4%.

The following individual ditch systems will have a deficit cash balance. Minn. Stat. 103E.655, subd. 2 allows for loans to be made from the General Fund to a ditch system with insufficient cash to pay expenditures. If the County Board transfers money from another fund to a drainage system account, the money must be reimbursed from the proceeds of the drainage system that received the transfer.

WHEREUPON the above resolution was adopted at the regular meeting of the Lincoln County Board of

Rick Drietz, Lincoln County Maintenance, informed the Board that the Historical Society has approved the HVAC replacement and now the Engineer from Bisbee has signed off on the project. We received an updated quote due to the added Engineer's cost. The cost would now be \$102,734.00 for the first floor. After discussion, the Board would like to hold off on this approval until we have a better idea of what the additional Electrical and construction cost would be. Information only.

Joe Wilson, Lincoln County Engineer, was present to give project updates. They were as follows:

- Need to advertise for the Bridge Replacement Projects soon.
- ADA Pedestrian Ramps Project
- Paving and Seal Coat Plans for 2023
- Will be looking over the 2022 Bridge Inspection report

Information only.

Wilson presented maintenance updates. They were as follows:

- Snow and ice removal
- Some truck issues
- Equipment maintenance to get ready for the next storm

Information only.

Wilson continues to work on finalizing and closing out projects from previous years. Information only.

Wilson informed the Board that he is looking at adding a salt brine tank to the next snow plow truck so we could apply salt brine to the roads to assist with keeping the roads clear of ice. This would add a cost of about \$7,000.00 - \$8,000.00. The Board was in consensus with adding a salt brine tank to the next snow plow truck. Information only.

Wilson informed the Board that he did receive a contracted price of \$3.05 per gallon for 20,000 gallons of fuel from Ag Plus. Wilson feels this is a cost savings for the county. The Board was in consensus with contracting 20,000 gallons of fuel at \$3.05 per gallon. Information only.

Wilson informed the Board that Boyer Truck has added two different surcharges to the Lincoln County invoice. The surcharges were added through the State Bid Contract. The new price is \$129,031.00. Motion by Nielsen, seconded by Hauswedell to approve the new State Bid Contract amount for the new plow truck from Boyer Truck in the amount of \$129,031.00 which was an increase of \$8,050.00 in additional surcharges from the original approved amount of \$120,981.00. All voted in favor.

Wilson informed the Board that the 2005 F250 is being auctioned on Purple Wave. The current bid is \$2,000.00. Information only.

Wilson informed the Board that we will be receiving \$4,666.89 for the damage to the Lake Benton shop. Once the repairs are complete if completed by 6/30/2024, we will receive an additional \$3,058.60. Information only.

Wilson informed the Board that a MN Dot contract for Federal Projects will be brought to the Board for approval at the next Board Meeting. Information only.

Tami Nelson, Lincoln County Financial Accountant reviewed the final budget. The budget is still at a 3% increase. Discussion was held on whether to leave the certified levy at a 3% increase or to move less money into capital improvement and approve a 0% increase. Resolution 39-2022 2023 Certified Levy will need to be approved. Motion by Drietz, seconded by VanDeVere to approve Resolution 39-2022 2023 Certified Levy which states that the levy increase is at 3%. Commissioner Drietz and VanDeVere voted in favor. Commissioners Hauswedell, Nielsen, and Sik voted in opposition. Motion failed.

Further discussion was held regarding a compromise between the 0% and 3%. Motion by Sik, seconded by Nielsen to approve Resolution No. 39-2022 2023 Certified Levy which states that the levy increase is at 1.5%. Commissioner Hauswedell, Nielsen and Sik voted in favor. Commissioner Drietz and VanDeVere voted in opposition. Motion carried by majority vote.

Resolution No. 39-2022 2023 Certified Levy

WHEREAS, the County Auditor of Lincoln County, Minnesota, has made and submitted her estimate of expenses and revenues of said County for the year 2023, as required by law, and the County Board of said county have duly examined and considered the same,

WHEREAS, the Board has determined that the debt service does not need to be budgeted at 5% above the required payments and if a larger payment is required than the budget, this amount will come from reserves.

WHEREAS, the Taxable General Obligation Tax Abatement Bonds Series 2020A Bond Payment will be paid from other sources of Revenue and will not increase the tax levy.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that there is hereby approved, the following certified levy, be ordered extended against the taxable property of said County of Lincoln for the year 2023. The detail of the County Budget is on file in the County Auditor's Office, Lincoln County Courthouse, Ivanhoe, Minnesota, and may be reviewed during normal business hours.

Resolution 40-2022 Resolution Supporting Community Supervision Workgroup, New Funding Formula for Probation

Endorsing the efforts of the Community Supervision Work Group and urging the legislature to pass a new funding formula and significant appropriation during the 2023 legislative session.

WHEREAS, community supervision is a fundamental part of the criminal justice system in Minnesota and funding sufficient to ensure effective services is vital to public safety in all communities across the state; and

WHEREAS, community supervision includes services such as probation, supervised release, and intensive supervised release; and

WHEREAS, Minnesota's counties provide essential community supervision services both as mandated by M.S. Chapter 244.19 and also as delegated by the Department of Corrections under M.S. Chapter 401; and

WHEREAS, when the Legislature decided that community supervision was best delivered through a state-county partnership, it stated a clear intent that the state would provide significant funding to the counties for the operation of local programs; and

WHEREAS, over the past 20 years, Minnesota has become the state with the lowest level of corrections funding in the nation because the Legislature has not upheld its promise to provide adequate state resources to support community supervision; and

WHEREAS, the Legislature's failure to adequately fund community supervision has increased local property taxes on residents and businesses; and,

WHEREAS, a revised community supervision funding formula is necessary to ensure that all communities in Minnesota have enough state funding to provide a consistent standard for effective, evidence-based community supervision services, regardless of local capacity to pay; and

WHEREAS, the Association of Minnesota Counties assembled the Community Supervision Work Group including county leaders and experts in community supervision from all three supervision delivery systems to study the needs of community supervision departments statewide and develop a single funding formula that is transparent, needs based, and equitable among county and state supervision providers; and,

WHEREAS, the Community Supervision Workgroup has taken up its charge to convene stakeholders across the three probation delivery systems to oversee a study to create a unified recommendation for an equitable and adequate funding formula and appropriation; and,

WHEREAS, the Board of Directors of the Association of Minnesota Counties that represents the diverse interests of Minnesota's 87 counties, voted to support a new funding formula that provides counties with the resources needed to keep communities safe; now, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED, the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners endorses the efforts of the Community Supervision Work Group and urges the Legislature to pass a new funding formula and significant appropriation during the 2023 legislative session.
